GROUP LETTER

February 2023



Have you ever arrived late at one of our six churches in the Hambleden Valley and tried to tiptoe in quietly, only to be caught out by the click of the latch,

the squeak of a hinge, the clunk of the door?

A few years ago, some of us had a discussion about which Valley church you could sneak into most silently – we weren't convinced that there was one!

February is a good month to be thinking about doors and hinges. There are times in our lives when it can be helpful to stop, pause - like standing in a doorway - to look back on what has been, and to look ahead at what is to come. We can be the link between the two – the past and the future - rather like the hinge on a doorframe.

Candlemas – or the Presentation of Christ at the Temple - is that kind of hinge: it looks back to Christmas and the birth of a tiny vulnerable child in Bethlehem and it looks forward to the eventual shining bright light of Christ throughout the world, but also points to his suffering and death that is to come. Candlemas this year will be celebrated at Fingest on Sunday 29th January at 6pm – do come along to this special service.

And looking further ahead in February brings us to Ash Wednesday (22nd), a day when we pause again in a doorway and are encouraged to honestly acknowledge before God, the creaks and clunks, the rusty hinges in our lives, the things we try to cover up or hide, as we prepare to step into Lent and head on the journey towards Easter. Travelling along that Lent path, admitting to God these areas of our lives that are not the way we long for them to be, can be freeing, releasing as we experience God's loving forgiveness.

The following prayer from a New Guinea Christian may help us:

Lord, oil the hinges of our hearts' doors that they may swing gently and easily to welcome you.





Wild Plough Sunday



Many thanks to the Jacksons for inviting us to Hanger Farm, Fingest to shelter in the barn on Plough Sunday. Over forty people several tractors with two ploughs braved the weather which stayed dry almost until the end.

As a local farmer I see society becoming more urbanised and more remote from where food comes from. It is refreshing to celebrate Plough Sunday, where we ask for God's blessing on the land we farm, strength and wisdom to raise the year's crops and the different challenges of the seasons.

The lesson was the parable of the Sower, found in Matthew, Mark and Luke's gospels and unusually Jesus explained the meaning of this story. Rev. Sue Morton explored the idea that at different times in life we are sowers of the word, growers of the word and harvesters of the word. We had a large handmade map of the Valley on which we could draw local places and buildings and place a little soil from our fields and gardens for a blessing. There was also a giant jigsaw of a tractor and plough.

On our farm we have a steep field on the right-hand side of Fingest Lane going up to Bolter End. During the War, when Britain faced starvation, my grandfather had to plough up this field for wheat, he said "if this poor bank can grow a crop of wheat, we shall surely have victory" It did produce a crop and we call this field Victory Bank to this day. Forward to autumn 2021 we reserved the field and it failed due to drought, that is the seed germinated and there was insufficient moisture and the seedlings died, we resowed in spring 2022 and the same happened again, the third sowing in Autumn 2022 finally seems satisfactory, albeit with a few bare patches. Now, when my grandson and I go past we have taken to calling the field Disaster Bank!

Wild Church Plough Sunday reminded us that God is with us in challenging times and times of growth and encouraged us to notice him at work in the world around us.



Friday 2nd June 2023 at 7.30pm St John the Evangelist, Frieth

On Friday 2nd June at 7.30pm, we will be holding our annual Footprints Service at St John the Evangelist Church, Frieth, RG9 6PR. Usually held just before Mother's Day, this year Footprints will take place in the lead-up to Father's Day. At these particular times of year, the loss of a child can be particularly hard. They may be times of year when the pain of losing a child is difficult to bear, whether that loss is recent or many years ago. It may also be a time when remembering is important and a significant part of the pathway through grief.

The Footprints Service is a service for anyone who has lost a child during pregnancy or at any age or stage of life or has been affected by such a loss, whether parent, grandparent, teacher, friend or family member. All are welcome.

Shopkeepers

The green and gold HOVIS sign over the bridge in Hambleden is all that's left of "Stores and Bakery". The baker the delivered his bread in an affectionate manner. The proprietors, Peter and Anne Johnson, were unexpected: they had "cut glass" accents and a willingness to stock something wanted by only one customer. When he handed it over the counter with a conspiratorial smile, we did not know that Peter had commanded Lancaster Squadrons in the war and been a member of the elite band of Pathfinders. He later wrote (of Dresden) that he found it hard to justify "the deliberate destruction of a city whose military value to the enemy seemed negligible". It's all in his book The Withered Garland: Doubts and Reflections of a Bomber (New European Publications, 1996).

Arthur Wheeler's butchers in Hambleden has featured in many films but he was proudest of a clip not of him but of his gory hands at work, making a guest appearance in a Hammer Horror. You can now get your sausages from Hambleden Stores and Post Office.

Frieth, Pheasants Hill, Medmenham and even Turville had village shops. In Skirmett the one adjoining The Crown was run by Mrs Hodder from Lancashire. She wore a raised eyebrow and a starched white coat and treated children with suspicion. Few were brave enough to complete important bubblegum card collections.

A haberdasher in Lane End had a different attitude to children. Reels of cotton in every colour were bought one at a time to allow for return visits. The shop was named after the proprietor, Josephine, who sat behind the counter in a long grey housecoat, only revealing when she slowly rose to get another reel from the drawer that she was over 7ft tall.

In praise of trees, from saplings to ancients and beyond



I am in awe of trees not just from their size but also their individual and collective role in our well-being; I hug them with gratitude fairly regularly. From little saplings, bursting through the leaf litter in their hope and mine of not being gnashed by deer, (although sadly a fat chance for most these days unless protected), to the huge ancients as they are known and everything in between. The ancients are possibly the most valuable for nature and us, either as standing dead, dying or prostrate; though obviously not across a thoroughfare. Dendrology is the study of trees and the three stages in their lives are young, mature and ancient, the latter being usually the longest phase. An approximate age of a tree can be gleaned by flinging a tape around it five feet from the ground and measuring the result. An inch of girth equates to a year's growth for a tree in the open and half an inch per year for a tree in a wood. There are variables such as young trees grow

faster and trees fighting for nutrients, space and water will grow slower but overall, this method works well. I have learnt to my surprise that a hollow trunk is not a sign of ill-heath but is quite normal and is thought might help trees live longer. At maturity, trees stop growing taller and the crown reduces in size by gentle self-pruning. This is known as retrenchment and heralds the tree entering the ancient phase which can last centuries. Some branches are dispensed with and ejected and leaf production at the canopy is reduced yet the girth still grows to aid stability particularly during stormy weather. Trees can take decades to die and many further decades to succumb to storms. We have an oak tree here (see photo) undisputedly dead since the early nineties yet it still stands tall and even now provides a home for an incalculable number of living organisms. Every tree should be cherished but I accept that woodland management, about which I know very little, is also vital for conservation and often requires cutting down healthy trees to create glades. Especially ancient or interesting trees known as champions or veterans are recorded at treeregister.org on a map available to all and are worth stopping off to see on your travels. Personally, I find my girth increase as I age into an ancient phase very helpful for stability in all sorts of weather not just stormy.

be restored back to its original glory and progress is beginning to be noticeable.

The exterior dial and hands have been carefully restored and repaired and, thanks to several local companies, the exterior woodwork has been able to be straightened and re-varnished. Just before Christmas all was re-installed much to the excitement of villagers and the children at Frieth School.

Importantly, the Village Hall Committee has sought to involve Frieth C.E.C School and inform the children of the challenges that we have faced and their Headteacher, Mr. Martin Gosling, has been hugely supportive. After several talks in school, it was felt that such was the enthusiasm for our project – that we should ask the children to design their own assembly hall clock dial, which indeed they have. A winning dial design that reflected the school moto 'Let my Light Shine' has been chosen and the children are being kept informed of the varying stages of its manufacture.

With all this community interest in preserving our 'Turret' clock, we must now turn to the next challenge which is the restoring of the clock's inner mechanical working (clock *movement*) which is a hugely complex matter. As with the external restoration, we are fortunate to have the expertise of a renowned Buckinghamshire clockmaker who, alongside his workshop team, is more than up for the task. In a nutshell, the overhaul and servicing of our clock movement together with the reinstallation work will cost almost three times the amount already spent on the exterior so fundraising for phase two is critical.

We are very grateful to previous fund providers who have enabled us to complete phase one of the restoration. FINGEST

Peter Jackson



Peter Jackson was born on the 29th of July 1925 in Bracknell, in Berkshire. He used to joke that he had his own personal bodyguard, because his nanny was "stepping out" with the local Policeman.

In 1939 he was sent to Harrow School in North London. He enjoyed only one term there before war broke out. As a Harrow alumnus, Winston Churchill told the school that they were not to evacuate, and Dad endured the blitz, sleeping in the cellar of the school bookshop. He and his classmates would have to attend morning chapel still caked in dust from the bombing the night before. He left Harrow and attended a local Bracknell School, and joined the Bracknell Home Guard - he was "Private Pike" about 25 years before that character was invented. Eventually he was able to join up and he was enrolled with the Royal Welch Fusiliers. After a frustrating few months of training, unable to contribute to the war effort, he was posted into Europe to join the push of the Nazis back through Belgium & Holland - back over the Rhine. Many years later, at a dental appointment, an unidentified foreign object was found in an X-ray of his jaw - "oh that's that bit of shrapnel I picked up in Belgium. I wondered if that was still there". He was then posted to East Africa and joined the Somaliland Scouts. There he learned Swahili and how to ride a motorbike. Dad was still in East Africa in 1946, when his father concluded it was time to re-locate from Bracknell, and he bought Hanger Wood, which had been clear felled for the war effort.

On Dad's return from Africa, he and his father embarked on a programme of further land acquisition – Pound Farm in Cadmore End and Glebe Farm in Fingest were bought. And when the entire Parmoor Estate came up for auction, they successfully bid for the Mousells side of the Fingest valley. They had also intended to bid for Fingest Farm, but withdrew when they realised that the incumbent tenant was going to bid for his own land. Albert Prince did not forget that. By the end of the 1940s, Dad found leisure time to take up motorsport and to go courting. A sportscar was bought – an Allard - a British Sports Car with a large American engine. Dad was introduced to mum by a mutual friend, and they were married in London in 1953. By the end of the 1950s Mum and Dad had produced two of four sons and Dad concluded that more living space was required and Mousells was doubled in size.

In the early sixties, after a hard winter during which Dad had been attacked by a recalcitrant bull, he wanted to give up farming. He had other interests he wanted to pursue - and was lucky enough to secure a tenant for the farm in the form of Dick Barnes.

Dad joined JB Corrie, a fencing company, initially as a contractor/consultant and then as an employee, Director & Shareholder. He secured a company car, and as his work took him all over the country, the car was fitted with a 2-way radio to enable him to keep in contact with his office base (20 years before mobile phones became a "thing"). Indeed, when mobile phones were developed, Dad was one of the first people in the country to have one fitted in his car.

In the early 70s, death and serious injury were becoming an increasing concern in motorsport, and Silverstone Circuit concluded that they needed to engineer the "soft crash". Corries were consulted and Dad discussed various ideas with Silverstone. Used car tyres looked promising and Brian Trott was

employed to construct the "proof of concept" – very quickly, the "tyre wall" became an accepted feature of racing circuits throughout the world.

Albert Prince at Fingest Farm died in 1976. He had remembered Dad in his Will, but regrettably the money simply wasn't available to buy the land. However, Dick Barnes was able to take up the offer of "first refusal" and bought the land in Dad's place.

Into the 1980s, Dick Barnes was retiring, and James and Helen were ready to take on the farming operation at Hanger. Dad was also planning to retire, and one of the farm cottages was extended and re-modelled to become Long Hanger. Mousells was sold, and with her share of the proceeds, Mum was able to buy the Fingest Farm land from Dick Barnes – at last Fingest Farm became part of the overall holding.

On the 29th July 1990 Dad retired and devoted himself to Hanger Wood – to timber operations and shooting of course. Long after he had hung up his guns, Dad continued to support the shoot at Harecramp with his various unruly Labradors and his Land Rover, which was ingeniously fitted out to hang pheasants from its sides. He was still picking up at Harecramp in his nineties.

I took on the management of the shoot at Hanger - on a much reduced scale. Dad would have loved to keep going, but Mum was getting older and couldn't really be left on her own, so he became her carer. They continued to go out for a pub lunch 2 or 3 times a week. Mum died at the end of 2019. And so, as soon as covid restrictions started to lift, I took dad out to lunch every Thursday. He didn't care that at first, we were only allowed to sit outside the pub. He loved the community of Fingest and the Hambleden Valley.

Fingest Church, the Sexton - The role of sexton is a centuries old position in the church. The job of the sexton is to look after the contents and cleaning of the church, maintenance of the churchyard and graves and general duties. Another ancient post in the church was the Parish Clerk. This position was usually filled by a layman whose job it was to assist the priest in the care of the church and leading the responses of the congregation at services. The sexton was supervised by the Parish Clerk. Today a sexton is appointed by the minister and the Parochial Church Council, Not all churches have a sexton, the work being caried out by volunteers and contractors. However, large churches and cathedrals may have a sexton or a number of sextons working as a team.

"St. Bartholomew's, Fingest, Vestry Meeting

held at the Old Rectory, Fingest, 13th April, 1909. It was agreed that the Sexton should be paid at a rate of £3. 12. 0 per annum – an advance of 10/- per annum."

The current rate of renumeration for a sexton is on average $\pounds 21,128$ per annum with an average bonus of $\pounds 231$. Entry salary is $\pounds 19,759$ rising to an average of $\pounds 24,869$ at senior level.

The sexton was often asked to carry out additional duties eg. gravedigging, raising the flag for festivals and special occasions, preparing the church for services and ringing the bell.

"The Easter Vestry was held in the Vestry of Fingest Church on the Tuesday in Easter week April 2nd, 1929 at 7.30 p.m.

It was arranged for the flag to be regularly put up at Xmas, Easter and Whitsuntide and any other special occasions. It was arranged that the sexton should receive 2/6 a year for this work".




